Executive Summary

Introduction

The 11th Annual Review is a comprehensive descriptive report on the adult participants who received various types of treatment/recovery services from alcohol and drug programs contracted with the Los Angeles County Alcohol and Drug Program Administration (ADPA) during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year. Most of the information and statistics presented in the Annual Review are based on participant admission and discharge information collected through ADPA's Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System (LACPRS). LACPRS is an ongoing, standardized, computer-supported system sustained by a close working relationship between ADPA and contracted alcohol and drug program providers.

The 2006-07 Annual Review is composed of the following five chapters:

- ❖ Chapter 1 provides statistical information on participants in ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). This includes program admission, participant demographic, primary drug problem, and treatment outcome statistics.
- ❖ Chapter 2 describes treatment services by division and program type. For each program type, a description of participants who were served in the 2006-07 Fiscal Year is provided along with key trend statistics that occurred over five fiscal years, 2002-03 to 2006-07.
- ❖ Chapter 3 provides admission, participant, and outcome trend statistics by special programs designed to serve the following special populations: criminal justice defendants, homeless individuals, needle users, persons with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems, pregnant and parenting women, and public assistance recipients.
- ❖ Chapter 4 provides participant-related demographic statistics for each of the 163 community-based agencies contracted with ADPA to provide alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year.
- ❖ Chapter 5 is composed of statistical "Fact Sheets" which cover key Los Angeles County alcohol and drug-related indicators and outcomes.

ADPA-Funded Alcohol and Drug Treatment/Recovery Program Admissions

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, ADPA contracted with 163 community-based agencies that provided the following types of alcohol and drug treatment programs in Los Angeles County.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 163 ADPA contracted community-based agencies provided treatment/recovery services to a total of 45,459 participants who accounted for 56,411 program admissions

Table 2 shows the number of annual participants and program admissions from 2002-03 to 2006-07 fiscal years. Over the five fiscal years, the annual number of admissions to programs increased by 19.6% and the individual participants increased by 19.5%.

Treatment/Recovery admissions to programs increased by 19.6% over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07)

Participant Characteristics

Participant demographics have remained relatively constant over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, most of the treatment/recovery program participants were male (64.7%); Hispanic/Latino (35.7%), White (29.0%), or Black/African American (26.3%); between 25 and 44 years of age (54.3%); had 9 to 12 years of education (76.1%); and unemployed (67.5%). Methamphetamine (29.8%) was the most frequently reported primary drug problem followed by cocaine/crack (22.1%) and alcohol (20.4%).

Participant Discharge Status

Participants with “Positive Compliance” are those who completed treatment or left before completing treatment with satisfactory progress. Over half of the program participants had positive treatment outcomes four out of five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). The five year-year average for positive treatment compliance was 53.5%.

***Over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), an average of 53.5% of the participants
received a positive treatment compliance assessment at program discharge. They
successfully complied with their individualized treatment plans.***

Treatment Services by Division and Program Type

Program participant characteristics were relatively similar across program types. Regardless of program type, the majority of participants were male, between 25 and 44 years of age, had 9 to 12 years of education, and were unemployed. Most participants were Hispanic/Latino, White, or Black/African American. The notable exceptions for the 2006-07 Fiscal Year were:

- Of the six program types, only day care programs provided services primarily to female participants (77.7%).
- Narcotic treatment programs served the largest proportion of older program participants. Among the narcotic treatment programs (detoxification and maintenance), over half of the participants were between 45 and 64 years of age, 62.7% and 56.1%, respectively.

Treatment Services by Division and Program Type - Continued

- Methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for three program types; day care (40.9%), outpatient counseling (32.1%), and residential services (36.0%). Over 90.0% of participants in narcotic treatment programs reported heroin as their primary drug problem. These results are expected since, by design, narcotic treatment programs provide services to individuals addicted to heroin or other morphine-like drugs. Heroin (41.6%) also ranked as the number one drug problem for participants who received residential detoxification services.

Table 3 shows positive treatment compliance by program type for the 2006-07 Fiscal Year. Positive outcomes varied among program types. However, residential programs had higher percentages of positive compliance. The majority of participants in outpatient counseling (50.7%), residential detoxification (77.3%), and residential services (68.6%) complied with their treatment plans.

The majority of participants in outpatient counseling (50.7%), residential detoxification (77.3%), and residential services (68.6%) had positive treatment outcomes.

Special Populations

ADPA-contracted treatment/recovery programs address specific needs of certain populations such as criminal justice defendants, homeless individuals, needle users, persons with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems, pregnant and parenting women, and public assistance recipients.

Salient findings regarding special population outcomes are:

- Over the five fiscal years, methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids' (CalWORKs) participants. With the exception of 2006-07, methamphetamine prominence has grown annually from 29.2% in 2002-03 to 45.5% in 2005-06.
- The average percent of CalWORKs participants with positive treatment compliance for the five fiscal years was 52.7%. More specifically, over five fiscal years, 3,211 of the 6,089 CalWORKs recipients discharged from alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs successfully complied with their treatment plans.
- Admissions for participants with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems more than doubled over five fiscal years; 6,407 in 2002-03 to 13,932 in 2006-07. During the five-year period, alcohol was the most prominent drug abused by participants with co-occurring disorders. Each fiscal year, more than half of the participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.
- Over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), the majority of drug court participants reported cocaine/crack or methamphetamine as their primary substance abuse problem. Each of the past five fiscal years, the majority (66.0 - 71.0%) of the drug court program participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.
- In 2006-07, methamphetamine (44.3%) and cocaine/crack (37.1%) were the most frequently reported drug problems for female offender participants. During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 44.9% of the participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.

Special Populations - Continued

- Alcohol was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for general relief participants for the first three fiscal years (2002-03 to 2004-05). In 2005-06 and 2006-07 fiscal years, methamphetamine was the number one drug problem for general relief recipients. Methamphetamine use has increased from 21.1% in 2002-03 to 31.6% in 2006-07.
- A total of 50,290 homeless participants have been admitted to ADPA-funded alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs over the last five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). The percent of homeless participants reporting mental health concerns has increased slightly over the five-year period, from 16.2% in 2002-03 to 24.8% in 2006-07.
- In 2006-07, the most prominent drug problems reported by homeless participants were methamphetamine (30.1%), cocaine/crack (28.7%), and alcohol (19.2%). Each fiscal year, the majority (56.4% to 63.1%) of homeless participants successfully complied with their treatment plan.
- Each fiscal year, heroin was the primary drug problem for the majority (68.3 – 75.9%) of needle users. Over the five fiscal years, 52.6% of needle users left treatment with a positive compliance status.
- For each fiscal year, the majority (64.6% to 79.7%) of perinatal participants received services from a day care program. With the exception of 2002-03, methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for perinatal participants.
- During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 6.1% (980 of 16,028) of female participants reported being pregnant at the time of admission. Each fiscal year, methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for pregnant women. Methamphetamine use increased from 32.9% in 2002-03 to 48.6% in 2006-07.
- In 2006-07, over one-third (37.0%) of the Prison Parolee Network participants reported methamphetamine as their primary drug problem. Methamphetamine use has grown from 22.0% in 2002-03 to 37.0% in 2006-07.
- Over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), the number of Proposition 36 program admissions increased by 72.9%. Each fiscal year, methamphetamine ranked as the number one drug problem. In 2006-07, half (50.6%) of Proposition 36 participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status.

Introduction

The 11th Annual Review is a comprehensive description of adult participants who received alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year. Adult treatment services are traditional ADPA-contracted residential and non-residential alcohol and drug treatment/recovery program services (day care, detoxification, outpatient, and residential) provided to individuals who are 18 years of age and older.

The 2006-07 Annual Review is composed of the following five chapters:

- ❖ Chapter 1 provides statistical information on participants in ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07).
- ❖ Chapter 2 describes treatment services by division and program type. For each program type, a description of participants who were served in the 2006-07 Fiscal Year is provided along with key trend statistics that occurred over five fiscal years, 2002-03 to 2006-07.
- ❖ Chapter 3 provides admission, participant, and outcome trend statistics for special populations.
- ❖ Chapter 4 provides participant-related demographics for each of the 163 community-based agencies contracted with ADPA during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year.
- ❖ Chapter 5 is composed of statistical “Fact Sheets” which cover key Los Angeles County alcohol and drug-related indicators and outcomes.

The majority of the information found in the Annual Review is based on participant admission and discharge data collected through ADPA’s Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System (LACPRS). LACPRS is an ongoing, standardized, computer-supported system sustained by a close working relationship between ADPA and contracted alcohol and drug program providers.

For the purposes of this report, participant and program admission are defined, as follows:

- (1) A participant is an individual who is admitted and becomes actively engaged in an alcohol or drug treatment program.
- (2) A program admission is a treatment event that starts when the program admits the participant.

The Annual Review includes all adult participants who received services in ADPA-contracted treatment/recovery programs. This review does not include information on participants who received substance abuse services at facilities operated by federal agencies in Los Angeles County (e.g., the Veterans Administration), crisis intervention facilities (e.g., hospital emergency departments), private entities, and other publicly funded non-ADPA contracted programs. The Annual Review does not include information on ADPA-contracted youth/adolescent and prevention programs.

Chapter 1 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program

Introduction

Alcohol and Drug Program Administration (ADPA) contracted with community-based agencies to provide a range of treatment and recovery services to County residents with alcohol and other drug problems. Consistent with federal, State, and County reporting requirements, each time an individual enters or departs from a treatment program, standardized admission or discharge information is collected. Since a participant may be admitted to more than one program during a fiscal year, or return to the same program more than once, the number of participant program admissions can be greater than the number of individual participants.

LAC Program Admission and Participant Trends

Table 1.1 shows the number of annual participants and program admissions from 2002-03 to 2006-07 fiscal years. During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment programs provided services to a total of 45,459 participants who accounted for 56,411 treatment/recovery program admissions.

Over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), the number of program admissions increased by 19.6% and individual participants increased by 19.5%.

LAC Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 1.2 shows the type of programs that provided alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to participants over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). During the five-year period, most participants received services from an outpatient counseling program. More than half of the participants were admitted to an outpatient counseling program during the last three fiscal years (2004-05 to 2006-07). For each fiscal year, approximately 1 out of every 4 admission was to a residential service program. Day care program admissions remained constant; the five-year average was 3.5%. A slight decline in admissions to residential detoxification programs occurred from the first to the third fiscal years (2002-03 to 2004-05), then remained steady at 8.0% for the remaining two fiscal years (2005-06 and 2006-07). With the exception of 2003-04, there has been a downward trend in the percent of admissions (4.9 - 0.7%) to narcotic treatment detoxification programs. Over the five fiscal years, narcotic treatment maintenance programs accounted for approximately 4.0% to 6.0% of the admissions.

LAC Program Participant Demographic Trends

Table 1.3 shows the demographics for program participants over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). Participant characteristics have remained relatively constant during this period. The majority of participants were male (64.7 - 66.4%); between 25 and 44 years of age (54.3 - 63.3%); had 9 to 12 years of education (74.9 - 78.8%); and unemployed (67.5 - 82.8%). Most participants were Hispanic/Latino (34.2 - 36.1%), White (29.0 - 32.0%), or Black/African American (25.4 - 28.9%).

LAC Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

The primary drug problems reported by program participants over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07) are shown in Table 1.4. Each of the five fiscal years, approximately 1 out of 5 participant reported alcohol as their primary drug problem. Heroin use fluctuated annually during the five-year period, ranging from a high of 20.2% in 2003-04 to a low of 12.7% in 2006-07. In 2002-03, cocaine/crack was the most frequently reported primary drug problem. Both cocaine/crack and methamphetamine ranked as the most prominent primary drug problems reported by participants in 2003-04. Beginning with the 2004-05 Fiscal Year, methamphetamine surpassed cocaine/crack and became the most frequently reported participant primary drug problem.

One notable change in participant's reported primary drug problems over the first four fiscal years has been the steady increase in methamphetamine use; from 21.4% in 2002-03 to 30.8% in 2005-06. An interruption in the upward trend in methamphetamine users was seen in 2006-07 Fiscal Year. The percent of participants reporting methamphetamine as their primary drug problem in 2006-07 was 29.8%; this is 1.0% lower than the prior fiscal year (2005-06). During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, most methamphetamine users were Hispanic/Latino (50.1%) or White (35.0%) with an average age of 32.1 years. Methamphetamine users had the highest percent (33.1%) of female participants.

LAC Program Participant Discharge Status Trends

Table 1.5 shows treatment compliance over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). Participants with “Positive Compliance” are those who completed treatment or left before completing treatment with satisfactory progress. “Negative Compliance” refers to those participants who left before completing treatment with unsatisfactory progress. In four out of the five fiscal years, the majority of program participants had positive treatment outcomes. During the 2003-04 Fiscal Year, slightly less than half (49.4%) of the participants had positive treatment outcomes. The five-year average for positive treatment compliance was 53.5%

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 51.9% of 12,441 participants, who departed from programs with a negative compliance assessment, were in treatment for less than 30 days. This outcome is consistent with current literature which states that better or positive outcomes are associated with longer treatment duration.

Chapter 2 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program by Division And Program Type

Introduction

Chapter 2 provides a description of participants in alcohol and drug treatment/recovery program by division and program type. During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 163 community-based agencies operated a total of 410 treatment programs at 330 different facility sites located throughout Los Angeles County.

Alcohol and drug treatment/recovery programs are classified as either non-residential or residential and as one of the following six program types:

Non-Residential – Participants reside outside of the program facility while receiving treatment/recovery services.

- Day Care Programs provide counseling and recovery services to persons who have drug and/or alcohol-related problems. The primary purpose of these services is to provide a planned treatment program in a social setting structured to maximize recovery and rehabilitation of participants. Services include individual and group counseling sessions, alcohol and drug education classes, health and fitness activities, and social/recreational activities. The services are usually available a minimum of six hours per day, six days per week.
- Narcotic Treatment Detoxification Programs administer or furnish methadone and/or levo-alpha-acetylmethadol (LAAM) in decreasing doses, for a period not to exceed 21 days, to assist an individuals' withdrawal from dependency on heroin or other morphine-like drugs. Services include intakes and physical examinations, casework services, individualized treatment plans, body fluid tests, coordination of additional services with other agencies, and referrals to other resources.
- Narcotic Treatment Maintenance Programs administer methadone/LAAM, at relatively stable dosage levels for a period in excess of 21 days, as an oral substitute narcotic drug. The treatment protocol is accompanied by ancillary social and medical services for individuals 18 years of age or older who have a history of two or more years of dependence on heroin or other morphine-like drugs and two or more failures in alternative treatment programs. Services include intakes and assessments, body fluid tests, group and family counseling sessions, crisis intervention sessions, coordinating additional services with other agencies, and participant follow-ups.
- Outpatient Counseling Programs provide crisis intervention, counseling, and participant referral services to individuals affected by alcohol and/or drug-related problems. Services include screenings and assessments, development of treatment plans, individual and group counseling sessions, mutual self-help groups, coordination of services with other agencies, and referral to other resources. Outpatient counseling is designed to provide an alcohol and drug-free structured environment that encourages and supports a participant's effort to improve his/her level of functioning.

Residential – Participants reside in a drug-free program facility, operating on a 24-hour per day basis, receiving food and shelter as part of the treatment/recovery service.

- Residential Detoxification Services provide care and treatment for persons suffering from alcohol and/or drug withdrawal symptoms in a non-medical setting. These services are generally offered as preparation for entry into a treatment and recovery program, therefore, medical and psychological supports are provided. Services include physical examination and medical history, medication as needed, recidivism counseling, referrals to other resources, and after care planning.
- Residential Services provides a 24-hour live-in, drug-free treatment environment for persons with drug and/or alcohol-related problems. Participants are involved in no less than six hours of planned treatment activities per day under the supervision of trained staff. Services include intakes and assessments, room and meals, crisis intervention sessions, individual and group counseling sessions, mutual self-help group discussions, and social/recreational activities.

Admissions by Division and Program Type

As shown in Table 2.1, a total of 56,411 participant program admissions were reported during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year. Approximately two-thirds of the reported participant admissions were to non-residential programs.

Non-Residential Program Admission Trends

Table 2.2 shows non-residential program admission trends over five fiscal years, 2002-03 to 2006-07. Overall, the number of non-residential program admissions increased from a low of 28,752 in 2002-03 to a high of 38,645 in 2006-07. Outpatient counseling programs accounted for the majority of non-residential admissions each fiscal year. Over the five fiscal years, outpatient counseling admissions increased by 47.0%, while day care admissions increased by 4.0%. Narcotic treatment detoxification program admissions doubled from 2002-03 to 2003-04 (2,303 to 5,216), with significant decreases in annual admissions each of the following fiscal years (1,553, 706, and 367). Narcotic treatment maintenance program admissions have fluctuated over the five fiscal years, ranging from a low of 1,794 in one year to a high of 3,834 in another fiscal year.

Residential Program Admission Trends

Table 2.3 shows five fiscal years of participant admission trends for residential programs. During the five-year time period, annual residential program admissions fluctuated between a low of 17,766 (2006-07) and a high of 19,903 (2004-05). Each fiscal year, the majority (73.8%) of residential participant admissions were to long-term residential treatment programs. Approximately 25.0% or 1 out of every 4 of the annual participant admission was to a short-term, residential detoxification program. During the first two fiscal years, 2002-03 and 2003-04, there was a small increase in the number of annual participant admissions to residential detoxification programs followed by a decrease in the number of annual admissions each of the following three fiscal years.

Table 2.5 shows that with the exception of 2002-03 Fiscal Year, methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for day care program participants. Over the last three fiscal years (2004-05 to 2006-07), approximately 4 out of 10 participants reported methamphetamine as their primary drug problem. Conversely, there has been a steady decrease in the percentage of participants who reported cocaine/crack as their primary drug problem. Cocaine/crack as a primary drug dropped from 35.0% in 2002-03 to 18.5% in 2006-07. Also, during the five-year period, the percentage of marijuana/hashish users almost doubled, from 12.0% in 2002-03 to 22.8% in 2006-07.

Residential Services Program Participant Discharge Status Trends

Table 2.21 shows that during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 68.6% of the residential services program participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status; they were successful in complying with their treatment plan. Each fiscal year the majority of residential services program participants received a positive treatment compliance assessment at discharge. The five-year positive treatment compliance average was 63.4%.

■ ■ Chapter 3 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program Special Populations

Introduction

Special populations described in this chapter include criminal justice defendants, homeless individuals, needle users, persons with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems, pregnant and parenting women, and public assistance recipients. Trend statistics covering program admissions, participant demographics, reported primary drug problems, and treatment outcomes are provided for each special population.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, the following special populations received alcohol and/or drug treatment/recovery services.

California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids' Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Under the federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, adults receiving cash assistance through Temporary Aid to Needy Families [(TANF), which replaced Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program] have an 18 to 24 month limit on aid, during which time they have to engage in a set number of hours of work or work-related activity. There is a five-year lifetime limit on aid as well. When California adopted TANF, the State Legislature voted to rename California's welfare reform program California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs). Under the CalWORKs program, counties may provide additional supportive services to participants including mental health, domestic violence, and substance abuse treatment. These services are designed to remove potential barriers for participants trying to obtain and retain employment.

Participants are pre-screened by Department of Public Social Services staff during CalWORKs intake to determine if there is a possible substance abuse problem. Participants identified with a possible alcohol or other drug problems are referred to ADPA-contracted Community Assessment Services Centers (CASC) for a clinical assessment.

Participants identified with alcohol or other drug problems by CASC are encouraged to participate in a treatment and recovery program. ADPA's network of alcohol and other drug treatment/recovery programs provide services for CalWORKs' recipients. Participation in these supportive services is considered a part of the welfare-to-work plan. The time spent in substance abuse treatment and recovery services normally satisfies the participant's weekly program requirement for work or job training and related activities.

CalWORKs Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.1 shows that CalWORKs' admissions increased by 32.5% over the first four fiscal years (2002-03 to 2005-06) and then slightly decreased in 2006-07. The number of participants followed a similar pattern as admissions. Over the five fiscal years, admissions and participants increased by 25.0% and 23.3%, respectively.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 1,945 participants accounted for the 2,194 CalWORKs' admissions; 196 (10.1%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Chapter 3

CalWORKs Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.2 shows the type of programs that provided alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to CalWORKs' participants over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). During this period, outpatient counseling programs had the highest (41.1 – 51.4%) percent of CalWORKs participant admissions. Residential service admissions ranged from 24.0% in 2006-07 to 33.1% in 2003-04. In 2006-07, about 10.0% of CalWORKs' participants were admitted to a residential detoxification program compared to a 5.5% average for the previous four fiscal years (2002-03 to 2005-06). Admissions to day care programs averaged 17.0% in the five fiscal years.

CalWORKs Program Participant Demographic Trends

In Table 3.3, the majority of CalWORKs' participants were female (80.5 - 85.7%), between 25 and 44 years of age (67.9 - 76.9%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (78.0 - 85.2%), and unemployed (74.2 - 95.0%). Most CalWORKs' participants were Black/African American (24.4 - 34.7%), Hispanic/Latino (35.2 - 44.3%), or White (21.5 - 25.2%). One-fourth of CalWORKs' participants were homeless.

CalWORKs Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

Methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for CalWORKs' participants as seen in Table 3.4. With the exception of 2006-07, methamphetamine prominence has grown annually from 29.2% in 2002-03 to 45.5% in 2005-06. Cocaine/crack use declined from 27.9% in 2002-03 to 15.0% in 2006-07. Between 2002-03 and 2003-04, approximately 20.0% of CalWORKs' participants reported alcohol as their primary drug problem. Moreover, in the remaining fiscal years (2004-05 to 2006-07), the percent of alcohol use dropped to approximately 16.0%. There was a steady increase (10.3 - 14.8%) in participants reporting marijuana use during the five-year period.

CalWORKs Program Participant Discharge Status Trends

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 57.0% of the CalWORKs' participants were discharged with a positive treatment compliance status (Table 3.5). With the exception of 2003-04, in each fiscal year, the majority of CalWORKs' participants had positive treatment outcomes. The five-year average for positive participant treatment compliance was 52.7%.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Individuals with co-occurring disorders have mental illness and substance abuse problems. Based on findings by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), it is estimated that five million United States adults have a serious mental illness and a co-occurring substance use disorder (SAMHSA, 2006). In Los Angeles County, 24.7% of the adult alcohol and drug admissions in 2006-07 Fiscal Year had chronic mental health problems or disabilities.

The following salient points regarding individuals with co-occurring disorders are based on national and local statistics:

Office of Applied Studies – The Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS) Report (April 9, 2004)

- In 2001, nationally, males accounted for 56.0% and females 44.0% of the admissions for individuals with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse problems. In Los Angeles County, during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, the percentages of male (56.4%) and female (43.6%) participants were the same as what was reported nationally.
- The DASIS Report (2001) shows that nationally Whites (74.0%) constituted the majority of admissions identified for individuals with co-occurring disorders, followed by Blacks (15.0%) and Hispanic/Latinos (7.0%). In Los Angeles County, however, Whites comprised only 38.9% of participants with co-occurring disorders in 2006-07, 31.0% Blacks and 21.0% Hispanic/Latinos.
- Nationally (2001), alcohol was more likely to be the reported primary substance of abuse for admissions (45.0%) of individuals with co-occurring disorders. Opiates (21.0%), cocaine (11.0%), and marijuana (13.0%) were less likely to be the primary substances of abuse.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, in Los Angeles County, one-third (32.7%) of participants reported alcohol followed by cocaine/crack (23.6%) and methamphetamine (19.1%). During this same period, heroin (10.8%) and marijuana/hashish (9.3%) were less likely to be substances of abuse for participants identified with co-occurring disorders.

- In 2001, about 60.0% of national admissions for individuals with co-occurring disorders were to ambulatory/non-residential settings. Residential/rehabilitative settings accounted for 22.0% of the admissions and the remaining admissions were detoxification services (19.0%). In Los Angeles County, the majority (70.8%) of admissions for participants with co-occurring disorders were to a non-residential program, day care (3.3%), narcotic treatment detoxification and maintenance (4.3%), and outpatient counseling (63.2%). Residential services' programs accounted for 22.1% of the admissions and 7.1% were to residential detoxification programs.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Admissions and Participant Trends

For individuals with co-occurring disorders, the number of admissions and participants steady increased each fiscal year (Table 3.6). Over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), the number of admissions and participants more than doubled.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, there were 11,791 participants which accounted for 13,932 admissions to alcohol and drug treatment programs; 1,684 (14.3%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.7 shows that over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07) the number of admissions to outpatient counseling programs increased each fiscal year. In 2006-07, the majority (63.2%) of participants with co-occurring disorders received services from an outpatient counseling program. Admissions to residential services ranged from a 28.8% in 2002-03 to 22.1% in 2006-07. Over the five-year period, the percent of admissions to residential detoxification programs declined from 14.5% to 7.1%.

Co-Occurring (Mental Illness and Substance Abuse) Disorder Program Participant Demographic Trends

Table 3.8 shows that the demographics for participants with co-occurring disorders remained relatively stable over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). The majority of participants were male (56.3 - 56.4%), unemployed (70.7 - 93.9%), and reported between 9 to 12 years of education (70.5 - 75.8%). Most participants were White (38.9 - 43.7%), Black/African American (30.0 - 32.2%), or Hispanic/Latino (19.3 - 21.0%). The percent of participants with co-occurring disorders who reported being homeless decreased from 29.1% in 2002-03 to 20.5% in 2006-07.

Over the five fiscal years, alcohol was the most prominent drug abused by participants with co-occurring disorders (Table 3.9). Cocaine/crack was the second most frequently reported drug problem for participants with co-occurring disorders; with a five-year average of 24.7%. There were relatively constant patterns of abuse for heroin (10.8 - 15.4%), marijuana (7.0 - 9.3%), and methamphetamine (15.9 - 21.3%) during this five-year period.

Drug Court Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Drug Court is a full or part-time court that has specifically been designated and staffed to supervise non-violent drug defendants who have been referred to a comprehensive and judicially monitored program of drug treatment and rehabilitation services. First established in Los Angeles in 1994, there are currently 13 operational adult Drug Courts located throughout the County. The Drug Court Judge heads a non-adversarial team of court officers (defense attorneys, prosecution attorneys, and treatment counselors) designated to support the participant’s recovery through intensive supervision, drug treatment services, frequent drug testing, and court appearances.

The goals of drug court programs are to:

- reduce drug usage and recidivism;
- provide court supervised treatment; and
- offer the capability to integrate drug treatment with other rehabilitation services to promote long-term recovery and reduce social costs.

Drug Court Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.11 shows that the number of program admissions and participants decreased from 2002-03 to 2004-05 (16.0% and 19.0%, respectively).

In 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 2,018 program participants accounted for 2,418 admissions; 335 (16.6%) of these participants had two or more admissions. Drug court admissions represent 4.3% (2,418 out of 56,411) of all admissions to County-funded alcohol and drug treatment programs.

Table 3.14 shows that methamphetamine surpassed cocaine/crack as the most frequently reported primary drug problem for drug court participants in 2005-06. The percent of participants reporting methamphetamine use increased from 25.0% in 2002-03 to 42.6% in 2005-06 and then remained constant in 2005-06. During the five fiscal years, alcohol (4.2 - 6.2%), heroin (10.1 - 12.7%), and marijuana/hashish (4.8 - 5.9%) use remained fairly stable.

Female Offender Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

The Female Offender Program (FOTP) represents a joint effort by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs (ADP), and ADPA. This project was first implemented during the 1992-93 Fiscal Year.

FOTP provides community residential alcohol and drug treatment and recovery services to women parolees in four counties – Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, and San Bernardino. Primary referrals are female parolees graduated from the California Institute of Women (CIW) in-prison Forever Free Drug Program and women on community parole. Female inmates from the CIW in Frontera, who are paroled to Los Angeles County, voluntarily participate in community-based residential alcohol and drug treatment/recovery for up to six months.

The program objectives are:

- Provide up to six months of residential drug treatment services to each parolee who has graduated from the CIW in-prison Forever Free Drug Program and women on community parole.
- Improve female parolee treatment outcomes as evidenced by fewer drug-related revocations and related criminal violations.
- Support the parolee’s reintegration into society by encouraging a clean and sober lifestyle.
- Reduce State General Fund costs for incarceration and parole supervision.

Female Offender Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.16 shows that the number of admissions fluctuated over the five fiscal years, ranging from a low of 89 in 2003-04 to a high of 111 in 2004-05. The number of female offender participants has seen only minimal fluctuations during this five-year period.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 97 participants accounted for 102 admissions; 5 (5.2%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

As shown in Table 3.18, during the five fiscal years, the majority of female offenders were between 25 and 44 years of age (69.4 - 74.7%) and completed 9 to 12 years of education (71.4 - 83.1%). Table 3.19 shows that most female offenders reported either methamphetamine or cocaine/crack as their primary drug problem during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year. Until 2006-07, cocaine/crack was the most frequently reported drug problem. Cocaine/crack use declined from 50.6% in 2002-03 to 37.1% in 2006-07. Conversely, methamphetamine prominence increased from 17.2% in 2002-03 to 44.3% in 2006-07. Over the first three fiscal years (2002-03 to 2004-05), heroin was the primary drug problem for approximately 16.0% to 17.0% of female offenders. In 2005-06 and 2006-07, heroin users declined to 11.2% and 9.3%, respectively.

General Relief Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Existing State law (California Welfare and Institutions Code section 17000 et.seq) requires counties to maintain a general assistance program for indigent persons. Indigent persons are defined as adults, 18 years of age and older, who have no source of income or means of providing for their basic needs such as food, shelter, and clothing. In Los Angeles County, this program is known as General Relief.

Effective November 1997, all adult applicants applying for General Relief are required, as a condition for eligibility, to be screened during their intake interview to determine if there is a reasonable suspicion that he or she may have a substance abuse problem. These individuals are referred to an ADPA-contracted Community Assessment Services Center (CASC) for a professional evaluation, and, if appropriate, for urinalysis screening. Participants assessed and identified with alcohol or other drug problems are required to participate in a substance abuse treatment/recovery program in order to continue to receive General Relief benefits.

General Relief Admissions and Participants Trends

As seen in Table 3.21, from 2002-03 to 2003-04 fiscal years, admissions increased by 56.9% (3,560 to 5,584). However, this was followed by a decrease in admissions from 4,315 in 2004-05 to 3,178 in 2006-07. The number of General Relief participants followed a similar pattern. Over the five fiscal years, admissions decreased by 10.7% and participants by 13.8%.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 2,945 participants accounted for 3,178 admissions; 205 (7.0%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Table 3.23 shows the demographics for General Relief participants over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). The majority of participants were male (63.2 - 70.6%), between 25 and 44 years of age (57.6 - 63.0%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (77.4 - 80.9%), and unemployed (81.9 - 90.8%). General Relief participants were mostly Hispanic/Latino (37.1 - 41.2%), Black/African-American (24.8 - 31.3%), or White (23.2 - 26.4%). Over the first two fiscal years (2002-03 to 2003-04), 3 out of every 10 participants reported being homeless and 4 out of 10 were homeless for the remaining fiscal years (2004-05 to 2006-07).

Table 3.24 shows that in 2002-03, alcohol (29.4%), cocaine/crack (23.8%), and methamphetamine (21.1%) were the most frequently reported drug problems for General Relief participants. In spite of the downward trend for alcohol use, it remained the most frequently reported substance of abuse for the first three fiscal years (2002-03 to 2004-05). In 2005-06, methamphetamine became the number one drug problem reported by General Relief participants. Over the five fiscal years, methamphetamine use increased each fiscal year, from 21.1% in 2002-03 to 31.6% in 2006-07. General Relief participants reporting heroin as their primary drug problem has remained constant over the five-year period, averaging 11.0%. Approximately 20.0% to 24.0% of the General Relief participants reported cocaine/crack as their primary problem each of the five fiscal years.

Homeless Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

A “homeless person” is defined as someone who is living on the street or in an emergency shelter, or who would be living on the street or in an emergency shelter without supportive housing assistance. According to the 2007 Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count, there are an estimated 73,702 homeless people on any given day in the County of Los Angeles (Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority). A homeless individual is more likely to have disabling conditions such as physical or mental disability, depression, alcohol and/or drug use, or chronic health problems.

A total of 50,290 homeless participants have been admitted to ADPA-funded alcohol and drug treatment programs over the last five fiscal years, 2002-03 to 2006-07. During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, homeless participants were served in 315 of 410 (76.8%) of the ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment programs. They received such services as crisis intervention, screenings and assessments, individualized treatment plans, individual and group counseling sessions, and referrals.

The following salient points regarding homeless program participants are based on national and local statistical findings.

- Nationally, according to The Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS) Report prepared in 2006 by the Office of Applied Studies, homeless participants comprised 13.0% of all admissions to public-funded substance abuse treatment facilities in 2004. Over each of the last five fiscal years, homeless participants in Los Angeles County comprised from 19.7% to 24.8% of all admissions to ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment admissions.
- The DASIS Report shows that nationally the majority (77.0%) of homeless admissions are to residential detoxification (56.0%) and residential services (21.0%). In Los Angeles County, 72.7% to 76.8% of homeless participants received services from a residential program during the five fiscal years.
- Nationally and locally, homeless admissions to treatment were older than those who were not homeless. According to the DASIS Report, nationally the average age of the homeless alcohol and drug admissions was 39. In Los Angeles County, the average age for homeless program participants over the last five fiscal years was 38.
- Nationally, males constituted 78.0% of homeless admissions. In Los Angeles County, male participants ranged from 62.5% to 65.6% (2002-03 to 2006-07).
- Nationally, alcohol was the primary substance of abuse for more than half (52.0%) of homeless program admissions, followed by opiates (21.0%) and cocaine (17.0%). In Los Angeles County, the three most prominent primary drug problems reported during the 2002-03 Fiscal Year were cocaine/crack (32.0%), alcohol (24.9%), and methamphetamine (19.1%). By 2006-07 Fiscal Year, the order of these three changed to methamphetamine (30.1%), cocaine/crack (28.7%), and alcohol (19.2%).
- According to SAMHSA’s Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), in 2004 females comprised 22.0% of the reported homeless admissions nationally. Around the same time period in Los Angeles County, females comprised 35.2% of the homeless participants admitted to ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug programs. The percent of female participants who were homeless in Los Angeles County was 13.2% higher than what was reported nationally. Note that in Los Angeles County during the last five fiscal years, 34.4% to 37.5% of the homeless program participants were female.

Chapter 3

Homeless Admissions and Participant Trends

Over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), the number of homeless admissions ranged from a low of 11,126 in 2006-07 to a high of 11,990 in 2004-05 (Table 3.26).

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 9,819 participants accounted for 11,126 admissions to alcohol and drug treatment programs; 1,111 (11.3%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Table 3.27 shows that in each fiscal year, approximately 6 out of every 10 participants received treatment from a residential services program. From 2002-03 to 2004-05, residential detoxification programs accounted for 13.7% to 16.2% of the admissions for homeless participants and then dropped to 9.9% for the two remaining fiscal years. Admissions to outpatient counseling programs ranged from 17.9% to 26.2% during this five-year period.

Homeless Program Participant Demographic Trends

According to Table 3.28, during the last five fiscal years, most of the homeless participants were male (62.5 - 65.6%), between 25 and 44 years of age (57.6 - 65.4%), unemployed (80.5 - 96.8%), and most were White (31.9 - 34.8%), Black/African American (30.8 - 36.8%), or Hispanic/Latino (24.9 - 28.9%). The percent of homeless with mental health concerns increased slightly, from 16.2% in 2002-03 to 24.8% in 2006-07.

Homeless Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

In the 2002-03 Fiscal Year, cocaine/crack (32.0%) was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for homeless program participants (Table 3.29). By 2005-06, cocaine/crack had been replaced as the number one primary drug problem by methamphetamine (30.7%). Between 2002-03 and 2003-04, alcohol was the primary drug problem for 1 out of every 4 homeless participant compared to 1 out of every 5 for the remaining three fiscal years (2004-05 to 2006-07). Over the five fiscal years, homeless participants reporting heroin use remained relatively constant, ranging from 17.2% in 2003-04 to 12.9% in 2006-07.

Needle User Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Needle users carry an increased risk of blood-borne infections, including HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C, through the sharing of syringes and other injection paraphernalia. According to a report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, there is an estimated one million active injection drug users in the United States (May 2002).

Salient findings from national and local sources on needle user program admissions and participants are as follows:

Office of Applied Studies – The Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS) Report (September 23, 2005)

- In 2003, there were 237,000 admissions reported to the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS) for which the primary or secondary drug of abuse was injected (13.0% of all admissions). Over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), Los Angeles County needle user program admissions comprised from 15.1% to 27.4% of all admissions to ADPA-funded alcohol and drug treatment programs.
- Heroin and other opiates accounted for 77.0% of all national admissions involving injection drug use. The other most commonly reported injected drugs were stimulants (16.0%) and cocaine (6.0%). Similarly, in Los Angeles County alcohol and drug programs reported heroin as the primary problem for 71.9% (five-year average) of needle user program participants. Locally, methamphetamine (13.0 - 19.6%) was the second most prominent drug of abuse among needle users during the five fiscal years.
- National admissions involving injection drug users (IDU) were predominantly among Whites (65.2%), followed by Hispanics/Latinos (18.6%) and Blacks/African Americans (12.3%). During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, similar patterns may be discerned in Los Angeles County IDU admissions although the racial/ethnic breakdown differs: White (41.1%), Hispanic/Latino (38.6%), and Black/African American (13.1%).

Needle User Program Admissions and Participant Trends

Table 3.31 shows that the program admissions for needle users decreased by 26.9% over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). With the exception of a sharp increase of 36.3% from 2002-03 to 2003-04, admissions steady declined each fiscal year. The number of program participants followed a similar pattern as admissions, decreasing by 21.6% over the five-year period.

Needle User Program Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.32 describes the patterns of utilization of alcohol and drug program services by needle users during five fiscal years. Over the last four fiscal years, there was a large decrease in the percent of admissions to NTP detoxification programs; from 28.5% in 2003-04 to 3.9% in 2006-07. NTP maintenance admissions fluctuated during the five-year period, ranging from a low of 13.1% in 2002-03 to a high of 26.8% in 2006-07. Admissions to outpatient counseling (16.1 - 22.3%) and residential detoxification (18.3 - 24.4%) programs remained relatively constant during the five fiscal years.

Needle User Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

For five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), heroin was the primary drug problem for the majority of needle users. Alcohol, cocaine/crack, and marijuana use remained stable throughout this period as the primary drug problem among needle users. During the first three fiscal years (2002-03 to 2004-05), the percent of needle users who reported methamphetamine as their primary drug remained constant (13.0 - 14.9%) and then slightly increased over the two remaining fiscal years.

Perinatal Services Network Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

The Office of Perinatal Substance Abuse oversees a statewide network of approximately 300 public-funded perinatal alcohol and other drug treatment programs that annually serve over 38,000 pregnant and parenting women, plus their children. In the Los Angeles County, during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, ADPA contracted with 38 community-based agencies that provide 51 perinatal programs which served 1,388 women.

The Perinatal Services Network provides:

- Programs that empower women to achieve and maintain clean and sober living, deliver healthy infants, strengthen family units, and lead productive lives.
- Perinatal services are designed to be gender specific and culturally relevant.
- Treatment and recovery options include: long-term residential treatment, day care services, outpatient counseling, narcotic replacement therapy, case management services, transitional housing, and sobering living services.

In addition, perinatal treatment programs address the following women specific issues:

- ◆ cooperative child care
- ◆ transportation
- ◆ parenting skills building
- ◆ health education
- ◆ child development education
- ◆ linkages to medical, HIV/TB testing and counseling, education, and vocational services

Perinatal Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.36 shows that over the five fiscal years perinatal admissions dropped to 1,231 in 2004-05, then rose to 1,499 in 2006-07. The number of participants followed a similar pattern of decreases and increases over the five fiscal years.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 1,388 participants accounted for 1,499 admissions; 106 (7.6%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Chapter 3

Perinatal Program Participant Admissions by Program Type

Table 3.37 shows that in each fiscal year, the majority (64.6 - 79.7%) of perinatal services were provided in day care program facilities. Day care services are non-residential programs which provide planned treatment services in a social setting structured to maximize recovery and rehabilitation of participants. Services include individual and group counseling sessions, alcohol and drug education classes, health and fitness activities, and social/recreational activities. Program participants must attend scheduled, formalized services at least three hours per day, three times per week. The services are usually available a minimum of six hours per day, six days per week.

Admissions to outpatient counseling (12.6 - 20.2%) and residential service (7.5 - 16.6%) programs remained relatively constant. During the five-year period, residential detoxification, narcotic treatment detoxification, and narcotic maintenance programs accounted for only 1.2% (78 out of 6,747) of the total perinatal admissions.

Perinatal Program Participant Demographic Trends

As shown in Table 3.38, the demographics for perinatal participants remained relatively constant over five fiscal years. The majority of participants were between 25 and 44 years of age (64.0 - 72.4%), completed 9 to 12 years of education (74.8 - 81.5%), and unemployed (74.8 - 92.5%). Most perinatal participants were Hispanic/Latina (27.8 - 41.5%), Black/African American (31.1 - 45.6%), or White (19.9 - 23.0%). Each fiscal year, approximately 20.0% of perinatal participants were homeless at admission. The percent of pregnant participants ranged from a low of 11.5% in 2005-06 to a high of 19.9% in 2006-07.

Perinatal Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

According to Table 3.39, in 2002-03, cocaine/crack was the most prominent primary drug problem reported by perinatal program participants. Cocaine/crack use declined each fiscal year, from 36.1% in 2002-03 to 18.2% in 2006-07. The prominence of methamphetamine use has increased from 27.0% in 2002-03 to 45.3% in 2006-07. During the five fiscal years, alcohol use remained fairly constant (12.7 - 14.4%). Marijuana as a primary drug problem increased from 11.5% in 2002-03 to 18.2% in 2006-07.

Pregnant Women Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

Substance use during pregnancy continues to be an ongoing concern because of the risks that illicit drugs, alcohol, and tobacco use pose to the mother, siblings, and unborn children. In 2004, the California Maternal and Infant Health Assessment estimated that 100,000 infants are born prenatally exposed to alcohol, and an estimated 20,000 to 60,000 are born prenatally exposed to illicit drugs.

The following are some State and local statistics regarding pregnant women who participated in public-funded substance abuse programs.

- During 2006, 4,507 (5.9%) of the 76,204 women admitted to treatment in California were pregnant at the time of admission (Office of Applied Research and Analysis - California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs). The percent of pregnant women in treatment were similar for both Los Angeles County and California alcohol and drug treatment programs. In Los Angeles County, during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 980 (6.1%) of the 16,028 women program participants were pregnant at admission (Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System).
- Among pregnant women admitted to treatment in California, methamphetamine was the primary drug of abuse at 59% followed by marijuana at 14%, alcohol at 9%, and heroin at 8%. Locally, in Los Angeles County (2006-07 Fiscal Year), most pregnant women reported methamphetamine (48.6%), marijuana (17.3%), cocaine/crack (13.7%), alcohol (11.8%), or heroin (5.9%) as their primary substance of abuse.

Below are additional Los Angeles County statistics regarding pregnant women who received alcohol and drug treatment services during the 2006-07 Fiscal Year.

- In Los Angeles County, 349 (35.3%) of the 980 pregnant women reported using illicit drugs in the past month. Pregnant women using illicit drugs were most likely to be Hispanic/Latina (37.2%), Black/African-American (31.2%), or White (22.4%). The average age was 27.5 years.
- At program admission, 7.0% of pregnant women reported drinking alcohol in the past month.

Pregnant Admissions and Participant Trends

Table 3.41 shows that over the first three fiscal years (2002-03 to 2004-05), the number of admissions for pregnant women increased by 33.3%. A slight decline (7.7%) was seen in 2005-06, followed by a 3.1% increase in 2006-07. The number of participants followed a similar pattern as admissions. Over the five fiscal years, admissions and participants increased by 26.7% and 28.3%, respectively.

Table 3.43 shows the participant demographics for pregnant women over five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). The majority of pregnant women completed 9 to 12 years of education (76.3 - 82.5%) and reported being unemployed (76.2 - 93.1%). Table 3.44 shows that methamphetamine was the most frequently reported primary drug problem for pregnant women during the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07). Methamphetamine use among pregnant women steadily increased from 32.9% in 2002-03 to 48.6% in 2006-07. There was a downward trend in pregnant women reporting cocaine/crack use over the five fiscal years. In 2002-03, 29.5% of pregnant women reported cocaine/crack use compared to 13.7% in 2006-07. During the five-year period, there was a slight decline in the use of heroin by pregnant women (9.3 - 5.9%). The percent of pregnant women reporting marijuana/hashish use increased from 10.3% in 2003-04 to 17.3% in 2006-07.

Prison Parolee Services Network Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

The Prison Parolee Network (PPN) is the result of a collaborative effort of the California Department of Corrections, California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs, and ADPA. Male and female offenders, paroled to Los Angeles County, voluntarily participate in an ADPA-contracted alcohol and drug treatment/recovery program for up to six months. Treatment includes residential, outpatient, and alcohol/drug-free living center services.

PPN’s program objectives are:

- to place parolees in appropriate alcohol and other drug treatment and recovery programs either from the community parole systems or immediately upon release from prison custody;
- improve parole outcomes as evidenced by fewer drug-related revocations and related criminal violations, and to reintegrate parolees into society and encourage a clean and sober lifestyle; and
- reduce State General Fund costs for incarceration and parole supervision.

PPN Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.46 shows that over the first four fiscal years, the number of admissions increased from 676 to 799 (18.2%). In 2006-07, this upward trend ended and admissions dropped to 643, a 19.5% decrease. The number of participants followed this same pattern; ranging from a high of 731 in 2005-06 to a low of 560 in 2006-07.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 560 participants accounted for 643 admissions; 71 (12.7%) of these participants had two or more admissions.

Proposition 36 Participants in ADPA-Contracted Alcohol and Drug Treatment Programs

The Substance Abuse and Crime Prevention Act (SACPA) of 2000, more commonly known as Proposition 36, amended existing drug sentencing laws to require that adult criminal defendants who are convicted of a non-violent drug offense, be placed in drug treatment as a condition of probation, instead of incarceration. Drug treatment, in lieu of incarceration, is also required for State parolees convicted of non-violent drug offenses or who commit drug-related parole violations. Vocational training, family counseling, literacy training, health, mental health, and other services are also provided. Proposition 36 allowed for dismissal of charges upon successful completion of treatment.

Proposition 36 was designed to:

- Preserve jail and prison cells for serious and violent offenders;
- Enhance public safety by reducing drug-related crime; and
- Improve public health by reducing drug abuse through proven and effective treatment strategies.

The successful implementation and ongoing operation of Proposition 36 in Los Angeles County was made possible because of the coordinated collaboration and constant communication among the Court, ADPA, District Attorney’s Office, Probation Department, Public Defender’s Office, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Community Assessment Services Centers, and community-based treatment providers.

Proposition 36 Admissions and Participants Trends

Table 3.51 shows that each fiscal year there was a steady increase in the number of Proposition 36 admissions and participants. Over the five fiscal years (2002-03 to 2006-07), the number of program admissions and participants increased by 72.9% and 65.8%, respectively.

During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, 14,245 participants accounted for 17,721 admissions; 2,693 (18.9%) of these participants had two or more admissions

Proposition 36 Program Participant Primary Drug Problem Trends

As shown in Table 3.54, over the five fiscal years, methamphetamine ranked as the number one drug problem for Proposition 36 participants. Methamphetamine use increased each fiscal year, from 36.1% in 2002-03 to 43.0% in 2006-07. During the five-year period, cocaine/crack continued to be the primary drug problem for nearly every 3 out of 10 participants. Alcohol (7.6 - 10.4%), heroin (7.3 - 8.7%), and marijuana (9.9 - 11.2%) use remained relatively stable during the five fiscal years.

Chapter 4 – LAC Participant Statistics by Agency

Introduction

Alcohol and Drug Program Administration (ADPA) contracted with community-based agencies to provide a comprehensive array of alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to County residents with alcohol and/or other drug problems. During the 2006-07 Fiscal Year, ADPA contracted with 163 agencies that provided treatment/recovery services to 50,817 participants. Note a participant can receive treatment/recovery services from more than one agency during the fiscal year. Therefore, the number of participants shown in this chapter is greater than the number of participants shown in Chapter 1.

The vast majority of the contracted agencies provide alcohol and drug treatment/recovery services to both male and female participants. Of the 163 agencies, 12 served only female participants and 7 served only male participants. Chapter 5 – LAC Alcohol and Drug Statistical Fact Sheets

Introduction

Chapter 5 is a composition of statistical “Fact Sheets” which provide information on key Los Angeles County alcohol and drug indicators and treatment outcomes. Alcohol and drug indicators are specific items used to measure and monitor AOD-related activities, issues, and problems. These indicators may include risk factors and consequences associated with alcohol and drug use. Treatment outcomes cover participants’ criminal justice involvement, mental and physical health status, employment, and living conditions.

Statistical Fact Sheet 5.1 provides alcohol and drug-related indicators over twelve years; 1995 to 2006, for Los Angeles County. The indicators are as follows:

- Alcohol and Drug-related Deaths (Public Health – Data Collection, Health Assessment and Epidemiology).
- AIDS and IV Drug AIDS Cases (HIV/AIDS Surveillance Summary Reports)
- Hepatitis – Type B (Acute Communicable Disease Program)
- Alcohol and Drug-related Hospital Discharges (California Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development)
- Alcohol and Drug-related Arrests (California Department of Justice)
- Alcohol-related Traffic Accidents (California Highway Patrol)
- Drug and Alcohol Admissions (Los Angeles County Participant Reporting System)

Fact Sheets 5.2 to 5.12 provide outcome statistics on homeless status, criminal justice involvement, physical health-related problems, mental health-related needs, and employment. Also, included are statistics for communicable diseases, sexually transmitted infections, participants tested for HIV/AIDS, and participants who received their HIV/AIDS test results. Other useful statistics such as length of enrollment/stay and participant demographics are available.
